PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear AGAP Member,

Spring is approaching in Zurich. We are in a mood of passage, with snow and dense fog still in view, while "a color stands abroad / on solitary fields," as Emily Dickinson would say. By the time you receive this Newsletter, the new ExCo will have met three times face-to-face in Zurich, and at many intervals via Skype. We are pleased to report that the new co-presidency emerges to be advantageous (and we are at a loss to understand how Deborah Egger managed alone for so many years). Buttressed solidly by the hard work of your elected committee members, we look forward to a first meeting with our new internal auditors, Ursula Hohler and Eleonore Lehr-Rottmann. They will continue the fine work of those who stepped down in Montreal, Antoinette Baker and Monique Wulkan. We thank all of you for your trust in our leadership.

Constitutional Amendments After our Assembly in Montreal, we were informed by the Swiss Business Registry Office (*Handelsregisteramt*) that our Constitution requires further amendments, to bring it up to date and in compliance with Swiss Association Law. Respective to this, we will soon be sending out a circular vote; we hope for your approval of the necessary amendments.

AGAP-CGJI-ISAP While delegations of the ExCo and the Curatorium of the CG Jung Institute Zurich, Küsnacht (CGJI) have continued to meet, there are no new developments to report to date. However, we remain pleased about the projects that have been emerging jointly between CGJI and ISAPZURICH—in particular, the Red Book home-coming at Zurich's Rietberg Museum, and the commemoration of Jung's death, which will take place at the Kunsthaus in June. We are grateful to ISAP's president Murray Stein and Vice-President Doris Lier, both AGAP members, who have been proactive in organizing these cooperative events. Another AGAP member, Andreas Schweizer, has been involved with contributions as president of the Psychological Club.

ISAP's Move Those of you who attended our Assembly in Montreal were alerted that ISAP was considering a move to the Psychological Club. At this date we must report that the move is not possible, due to, among other things, Zurich zoning law. ISAP has formed a committee that continues to search for a new training site, as well as for donors to support this project. Please contact us if you are interested in contributing.

AGAP Forum 2012 Plans for the next AGAP Forum are well underway. For their readiness to constitute the Program Committee we thank Josephine Evetts-Seckers as chair, Johanna David (Wales) and Frances Milne (Scotland). Their Call-for-Papers appears in this Newsletter. Later we will send details on the venue, which is near Burghölzli, has a splendid view of the Lake of Zurich, and is surrounded by garden pathways that peek into the homes of indigenous and exotic animals.

Celebrating Mario Jacoby At its January meeting, the ExCo was most pleased that Mario Jacoby joined our celebration of his life and contributions to Analytical Psychology. Together with five guests—including AGAP members Josef Marty (also SGAP president) and Ursula Kübler (SGAP ExCo member)—we toasted Mario's nearly fifty years as an analyst, supervisor, lecturer, writer and world traveler. He was AGAP's second president, or "Honorary Secretary," following Mary Briner—and he attended every IAAP Congress from 1958 to 2007. In the course of the evening, the fourteen of us realized that at least half had been his analysands or supervisees. We calculated that Mario probably touched the training and professional lives of an equal ratio of AGAP members from around the

world—which is not to mention the many other individuals who have been touched by reading his books and attending his public lectures. It can be truly said that Mario has been in the forefront of propagating Analytical Psychology.

An Oral History of AGAP While feting Mario, we realized that he is the last surviving member of the group of "wise ones" who shared the podium at the 50th Anniversary Celebration of the CGJI, in 1998. With this the ExCo recognized the value of preserving AGAP's history, and decided to embark on an oral recording that aims as well to shed light on the history of "Zurich training." We hope for input not only from members who live in Switzerland, but also from those who joined the ranks of analysts around the world. In this Newsletter you will find our first feature, with Peter Ammann interviewed by Audrey Punnett. Art. 6 Admission Procedures

The admission of new Members is carried out by the Executive Committee. The application must be approved by at least two-thirds of the Executive Committee's members. Application for membership must be submitted in writing to AGAP's Executive Committee. A curriculum vitae, diplomas, and information about professional activity must also be included.

The Executive Committee examines the application for admission. If the applicant fulfills the requirements for membership, the Executive Committee informs the Members of the application. Within 30 days any Member may present written grounds for objection to the President. In case of an objection, the Executive Committee reexamines the application.

The admission of new members is the responsibility of the Executive Committee. At least two thirds of the members of the Executive Committee must accept the petition.

The Executive Committee hereby presents the names of the new applicants for AGAP membership. In accordance with the Constitution, Article 6.2, these will be admitted to membership unless there is an objection by any current member and this objection is determined by the Executive Committee to be valid. THE RED BOOK AT THE RIETBERG


This is indeed a momentous time in the Jungian world! Jung's *Red Book*, or *Liber Novus* entered the world after decades of mystery had passed, in New York City at The Rubin Museum of Art (in partnership with The Philemon Foundation), on the 7th of October, 2009. Since that time, the book has traveled to the Hammer Museum in Los Angeles, and then on to The Library of Congress in Washington, culminating in crossing the water back to its home in Zurich, Switzerland.

The Red Book at The Rietberg is clearly the finest and most complete exhibit of all. In fact, Sonu Shamdasani (the guest curator at the Rietberg) himself feels that this is the only exhibition in that there are so many additional artifacts on display. It seems as if the Jung family (and other lenders) were reluctant to let any of their precious objects leave Switzerland so anyone who has seen the exhibit is truly fortunate indeed.

In addition to *The Red Book* itself, we can see Jung's paintings, carvings, sculptures, five parchment pages from *The Red Book* itself, the calligraphic version of the *Septem Sermones*, a model of a sailing boat, some sketches and drawings, and some examples from the *Black Books*. Each one of these was carefully chosen and comes out of the period when Jung was actually working on *The Red Book*.

The sample from *The Black Books* shown at the Rietberg exhibition is particularly moving. It reads: "My Soul, my Soul, where are you? Hear me, I speak, I am calling you—are you alright? I have returned, I am here again..."

The Red Book is opened to a new page each day, thanks to Lorenz Homberger, Director of the Rietberg. What is particularly noteworthy for me is the vibrancy of the colors in Jung's paintings in the book. It seems as

though there has been no deterioration whatsoever with the passage of time, helped undoubtedly by being preserved in the bank vault of UBS!!

Sonu Shamdassani and I agreed on one thing: If there was one of these precious objects that we could take home (other than *The Red Book!*), it would be the wooden carving of the Dog Grave (about 1920)! The story behind this carving is incredible and originates in the Protocols (on open access at the Library of Congress and will also be available on open access sometime in 2011 [it is now 50 years since Jung's death] at the ETH—in German only, both at the Library of Congress and at the ETH). The stories go as follows: Jung once had a dog called

Pascha, who always accompanied him as he worked in his garden. Whatever Jung would dig up from below the earth, Pascha would eagerly eat it up! Then Pascha died and this brought great sorrow to Jung. Then, one day, Jung was once again digging in his garden and a small robin came near and ate the grub that came up from the earth, just as Pascha had done so many times. Jung immediately called Emma to come and see this for herself, but by the time Emma arrived, the bird had gone. Jung felt this to be a reincarnation of his beloved dog Pascha. If one looks carefully at this wooden carving, you can see the little bird carved in at the top.

On another occasion, Jung relates once again (in the

Protocols), that Pascha was looking up at him in the garden with "the expression of the eyes which my father had." Jung suddenly felt that it was his father looking at him at that very moment! Jung incarnated this image in this wooden carving and it is indeed a privilege to see it here in Zurich.

If you have not yet seen *The Red Book at the Rietberg*, I would highly recommend coming to Zurich for the weekend of March 11-12, 2011, when you will have a chance to have a private guided tour of the exhibit as well as listen to AGAP members Murray Stein, Andreas Schweizer, Brigitte Egger, Paul Brutsche, and Toshio Kawai speak on various aspects of the Red Book itself.

ISAPZURICH

Murray Stein, President ISAPZURICH

2010 has been, like previous years, a beehive of activity at ISAP. From all reports, we have made some honey. As a consequence, there have been celebrations. However, there have also been disappointments in this year and therefore occasions for sober reflection. Not every venture tried has succeeded, even though the basic efforts of the School have proven to be extraordinarily productive.

ISAP's Move After the election of several new officers and members of committees at the General Assembly in March, it quickly became evident that creative energy was again available to move forward into the academic year with plans for the present and future. One of these was to begin laying the foundations for a pathway that would take the School out of its present home on Hochstrasse and into the building owned by the historically important Psychological Club on Gemeindestrasse. Until late summer, this looked more and more like a realistic possibility, and a great deal of excitement grew up around this prospect. At the IAAP Congress in Montreal, I had the pleasure of announcing that this would most likely take place in the spring of 2012. That is how things looked at the time, and so it came as a surprising disappointment to many of us at ISAP when it turned out that for several reasons this would not be possible. After a number of conversations and meetings, the decision had to be taken to abandon this attractive prospect and to formulate other plans for ISAP's future. With good spirit, ISAP Participants voted unanimously in October to continue the search for new quarters. This is now actively underway.

Special Achievements To be celebrated at ISAP in 2010 was a solid offering of excellent courses, seminars, lectures and special events, as well as the achievements of many students in their exams and personal developments. This is the measure of a school's caliber.

At the Opening Tea for the fall semester, too, we celebrated the authors in our community who have recently published articles and books, and for the occasion we were able to show an impressive array of publications during the past year. One of these authors, John Hill, whose book *At Home in the World* was the subject of the Zurich Lecture Series in 2009, was

MEET THE EXCO: KATHLEEN MOREAU



I had not returned to Zurich since graduation in 2001. My life had become quite focused on caregiving for elderly parents and end-of-life concerns. I was therefore delighted, when I arrived in the early morning hours of September 2009, to see the late summer sun reflecting off the distant mountains. I love this first view of Switzerland! I was in Zurich to participate in the AGAP Forum, and prepared to be renewed. The experience evoked a stream of memories and healing images denoting the richness of the landscape and of my time and training there during 1995-1999. One nature image conjured up another of an earlier time—long before Zurich—in Northern Canada: personal challenges and the ultimate fulfillment of completing a week-long canoe trip. I have resumed my enjoyment of nature.

I currently serve as Chair of the Ohio Valley Association of Jungian Analysts (OVAJA). I trained in California in the 1970's and since the 1980's have maintained a private practice in family therapy in rural Ohio. It's been challenging and gratifying to introduce to a very conservative community the value of therapeutically addressing difficult subjects (child sexual abuse; addictions)—then, following my training in Zurich, to introduce the appreciation for the power of deep self-awareness in the healing process.

I now enjoy the challenges that come with ExCo membership, particularly as we focus on the process of self-definition, both as individuals and as an organization.

AGAP HISTORY: PETER AMMANN

Peter Ammann—Interview with Audrey Punnett



Peter Ammann, Dr. phil., is a training analyst and lecturer at ISAPZURICH, and in private practice in Zürich and Geneva. He lectures regularly in South Africa, US and the UK. His documentaries include: *Healing in two Worlds—Jungian Psychotherapists Encounter African Traditional Healers*; *Sandplay with Dora Kalff*; *Spirits of the Rocks*; *Hlonipa—Journey into Wilderness*.

After the Matura I studied music, specifically the cello. Already before graduating I had a vague desire to get in touch with Jungian psychology. In the library of my grandfather who was a well-known pioneer of pediatrics I discovered Jolande Jacobi's book, *The Psychology of CG Jung*. I called her and made an appointment. Thus I entered the adventure of regular analysis... I was ambivalent about my musical studies. One day she told me "you must see Jung!" and arranged an appointment. Upon meeting him, Jung asked in his typical Basel dialect, "What do you want?" I told him I had doubts about my musical career and was

the quality of its faculty. ISAP is blessed with a wealth of talented, experienced, and recognized training and supervising analysts. One of the most outstanding of these, Dr. Mario Jacoby, turned 85 in 2010, and at the Spring Opening Tea the ISAP Community celebrated his life and his many contributions to Analytical Psychology and to the training of generations of Jungian psychoanalysts across the world.

Looking back on the year, I think we at ISAP can take satisfaction in having weathered disappointment well and in having notched many fine successes.

playing with the idea to study Jungian psychology. Jung told me music had to do with hearing and then made a link between *hören* (to hear) and *Gehorsam* (obedience) suggesting that listening with the ear could lead to listening to the inner voice...

Later I left the cello and began training at the Zürich Institute. After the propedeuticum, I started analysis with von Franz whose lectures I very much admired. From her, the great lesson I learned was to be able to make the bridge between the dreams and one's "real" life.

Having graduated from the Jung-Institute, my artistic interests went into another field. I wanted to go into filmmaking. I admired Fellini's films and knew he had been in a Jungian analysis, in fact with the very first Jungian analyst in Italy, Ernst Bernhard. Fellini admired Jung. When I told him that I was a Jungian analyst from Zürich, the door was open. He gave me the possibility to do my apprenticeship as an assistant when he made one of his most important films, *Satyricon*. By the way, a few years ago Fellini's dreambook was published. I gave a lecture about it at the conference, *Art and Psyche* in San Francisco 2008.

When I returned to Switzerland I went for a while into documentary filmmaking. This was an interruption in my work as an analyst. Then there was an unexpected change in my life. Going back into working as an analyst was preceded and influenced by

meeting Laurens van der Post whom I met in 1984. He was deeply Jungian and, in his life, achieved an extraordinary balance between action and reflection. He and his books aroused my enthusiasm for Africa.

In 1990 I was invited by Vera Bührmann to give seminars and lectures at the Jung Centre in Cape Town. This was the beginning of many lecture tours in South Africa. At the same time I made documentary films, in particular about the Bushmen and their fas-

cinating rock paintings. Later, at the IAAP Congress in Cape Town 2007, I organized workshops called *Healing in two Worlds—Jungian Psychotherapists encounter African Traditional Healers*. It was the beginning of a project including many meetings and workshops in South Africa as well as in Switzerland. I hope this dialogue and exchange will go on.

MEET THE EXCO: CRAIG STEPHENSON



I am a Jungian analyst with touchstones in both North America and Europe, as a Canadian who trained in Zurich and who lives and works in France. I graduated from the Jung Institute in 1998. Since then, I've also completed a training as Psychodrama Practitioner from the *Institut für Psychodrama auf des Grundlage der Jungschen Psychologie* (supervised by Doreen Elefthery) and a PhD from the Centre for Psychoanalytic Studies, University of Essex.

In addition to practicing as a Jungian analyst, I have given lectures and workshops, served as a Book Review editor for *Harvest* and *The International Journal for Jungian Studies* (IJJS), and published on various Jungian topics.

I have also had the privilege to translate Luigi Aurigemma's book *Jungian Perspectives* from French into English (University of Scranton Press, 2007). Luigi Aurigemma was the supervising editor of the translation of Jung's Collected Works into Italian, one of the early members of the French Society of Analytical Psychology (SFPA) and a historian at *l'École des Hautes Études de Paris*. For two years, we met regularly to refine the translation of his collected essays, completing our task only two months before he died.

At the Barcelona IAAP Congress in 2004, I joined the AGAP Ethics Committee, just when it began to draft new ethics guide-

lines. The Ethics Committee (chaired by Jan Bauer with additional guidance from John Desteian) worked updating the AGAP guidelines, looking for ways to refine the Logos of the guidelines to meet changing legal requirements and, at the same time, to guard a professional ethos of Eros fundamental to our work as analytical psychologists. During this time, I began to appreciate the special challenges that our elected AGAP officials take up, representing us as a professional association with members living all over the world but with its constitution and business governed by Swiss law.

Two years later, an interim position opened on the AGAP

Executive Committee, and I stood for the position (by a circular vote). I've been serving on the AGAP Executive Committee now for four years, first in a general capacity and specifically, now, as Ethics Committee Liaison to the Executive Committee. I enjoy the focused intensity of our meetings and the camaraderie. I especially appreciate the way we find ourselves looking to the history of AGAP for a sense of continuity with our foundations and, at the same time, looking at how AGAP can respond insightfully and innovatively to support our members as they meet the challenges of practicing analytical psychology in our time.

New Directions—Küsnacht, 4 Feb., 2010

The approximately 100 accredited analysts at the C.G. Jung Institute of Zurich with its training center in Küsnacht are receiving new and far-reaching rules for joint participation and decision-making in leading the training operation.

Creation of a training sector and a board to oversee it enables accredited analysts to take an essential leadership role within the training program. The Curatorium, which has also been active in operations until now, will concentrate its energy on strategic leadership of the Institute.

The reorganization is based on the 1948 Foundation statute supporting delegation of the Curatorium's operational tasks to the newly created board of the training sector. The corresponding delegation agreement was signed on February 2, 2011. On the same day, the newly created Assembly of the Analysts approved a regulation on tasks and organization of the training sector along with the analysts' corresponding joint rights of participation and decision-making. The new cooperative leadership concept strengthens the Institute and forms the basis for its successful further development.

Election of two new directors After the retirement of the longtime and highly regarded Director of Studies, Ursula Weiss, the assembly elected two new directors. As of April, Renate Daniel, MD, will take over as the new Director of Programs, and Annette Jörgens, MA, will become Director of Studies.
